
Current situation in Texas

- Texas adoption system works when it is properly funded.
- However, funding has been unpredictable & inadequate.
- From 1999 to 2005, state spending on \$94.65 to \$36.31 per pupil per year. instructional materials fluctuated from
- On average, Texas spends .35 cents per student per day on instructional content
