Consumer Guide to Health Care

This guide to information for the consumer on the quality of healthcare and to healthcare billing and pricing practices was developed by the Texas Department of State Health Services and the Texas Medical Board. It is required by Chapter 324. Texas Health and Safety Code and Chapter 154. Texas Occupations Code. 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
S.B. 1731, 80th Legislature

- ➤ SECTION 3. Subsection (k), Section 108.009, Health and Safety Code, is amended to read as follows:
 - (k) The council (department) shall collect health care data elements relating to payer type, the racial and ethnic background of patients, and the use of health care services by consumers. The council (department) shall prioritize data collection efforts on inpatient and outpatient surgical and radiological procedures from hospitals, ambulatory surgical centers, and free-standing radiology centers.

- Data collection limited to outpatients that had surgical or radiological procedures
 - Facilities estimate annual costs ranging from \$0 To \$40,000
- Collected from non-exempt
 - Hospitals
 - Ambulatory Surgery Centers
 - Not collected from free-standing radiology centers

Data security and patient confidentiality:

- Secure transmission of data from healthcare facilities to contract vendor
- Secure processing of data by vendor
- Secure transmission of data from vendor to DSHS
- Secure storage of data at DSHS
- Documented processes for handling of data at DSHS
- Oversight of release of data for research by Scientific Review Panel (SRP)




