I am Rev. Dr. Angela Ravin-Anderson, leader of the Social Justice Ministry of the historic Wheeler Avenue Baptist Church, located in the Third Ward of Houston, Texas and in Congressional District 18. I live in Congressional District 9, and my business is also located in District 18.

I write today in defense of democracy and dignity.

During the American Revolution, our foreparents declared a simple yet profound truth: "No taxation without representation." That cry was not merely about taxes—it was about power, voice, and justice. It was a declaration that the people—not the privileged few—should shape the future of this nation.

This is a democracy. We decided a long time ago that no king—no one person, no ruling class—would govern over us. We would govern ourselves, through fair and free representation. That's why the current efforts to redraw Congressional Districts 18 and 9 and other coalition districts like them are deeply troubling. These districts are more than lines on a map—they are legacies.

District 18 is sacred ground. It gave us the thunderous voice of Congresswoman Barbara Jordan—the first Black woman elected to Congress from the South. It gave us Mickey Leland, who fought hunger around the world while advocating for justice at home. And it has been powerfully served for nearly three decades by Congresswoman Sheila Jackson Lee, a fierce defender of civil rights and dignity for all people.
