## Message:

As a native Houstonian and proud resident of this city, I am outraged by Senate Resolution 5 (SR 5)—a shameless and undemocratic attempt to redraw Texas' congressional map for the sole benefit of the Republican Party. These proposed districts are not only absurd in their geography—they are an outright attack on fair representation, community power, and the basic promise of our democracy.

Under this new map, Houston—one of the most diverse and dynamic cities in the country—would be carved into five grotesquely shaped congressional districts that stretch across hundreds of miles, roping in distant cities and counties that have little to no shared interest between communities. These lines are not about representation—they are about control. cover for one of the most aggressive power grabs in recent memory. Redistricting should be about drawing fair maps that reflect our communities—not dividing us to protect incumbents or curry favor with a former president.

SR 5 makes a mockery of representative democracy. It silences Texans and Houstonians. It violates the spirit—and likely the letter—of the Voting Rights Act. And it ensures that millions of Texans will be represented by someone who has no real connection to their lives, their neighborhoods, or their future.

I stand in strong opposition to SR 5. I stand for Houston. I stand for fair maps. And I stand with every Texan who believes that we deserve a government that reflects us—not one that rigs the system to stay in power.
