Dear members of the senate,

I understand that given the current legal decisions regarding the four districts up for consideration by the state of Texas, TX-9, TX-18, TX-29, and TX-33, that currently, the Texas legislation must address. However, what concerns me is that President Donald Trump is asking for five new Republican seats in Texas. Now, in Texas, Republicans have been considered the party of "small government" for decades. Governor Abbott famously "went to work, sued the federal government, and went home" as Attorney General, and during Joe Biden's presidency, he fought him consistently, even bussing migrants to Washington, D.C. However, when the federal government demands Abbott find five new Republican seats, Abbott immediately hops to it? If the current electoral map that already skews heavily Republican was the will of the American people, how should legislators change that, especially at the request of the federal government?
